A Conference in conjunction with the exhibition, "On the Nalanda Trail: Buddhism in India, China, & Southeast Asia"

19 - 20 January 2008 (Sat - Sun)  
9.00am - 6.00pm

Asian Civilisations Museum, Ngee Ann Auditorium

The two day conference will focus on the spread of Buddhism with special reference to the role of Nalanda as a centre of learning, in conjunction with the exhibition - *On the Nalanda Trail: Buddhism in India, China and Southeast Asia*. Interconnections between India, China and Southeast Asia will be explored and re-examined through this conference. There will be papers highlighting new findings or new interpretations of Buddhist art, architecture, history and literature in India, Central Asia, China and Southeast Asia. Scholars will be discussing on the multidimensional and multicultural significance of Amaravati, Nalanda and Srivijaya; the iconography of paintings at Kizil and Xinjiang in Central Asia; and the Chinese assimilation of Avalokiteshvara into Guanyin.

Contemporary discussion such as a new reading of *Siyuki (Xiyouji)* and Samuel Beal's translation of Xuanzang's notes, views of women's role in Theravada Buddhism and the importance of Vipassana in contemporary Buddhist practice will also be explored. As a result, the conference will cover different focal points from ancient history, archaeology to art and living practice, offering a wide spectrum of reference points on the trail of Buddhism in Asia. The conference will have a line-up of both internationally and locally renowned scholars who have led the way in related research and education.

Registration can be done via our website or personally at the museum's Front Desk by 13 January 2008. We regret that we cannot register participants over the phone. Registration for the conference will be accepted on a first-come-first-serve basis and the fee is SGD \$100. The fee includes admission to all programmes during the two-day conference; complimentary entry to the ACM galleries; conference kit; light refreshments and lunch. FOM and MV members, full-time students and concession pass holders are eligible for a 20% discount (SGD \$80).

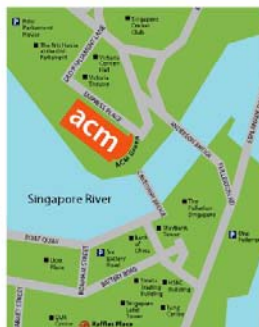

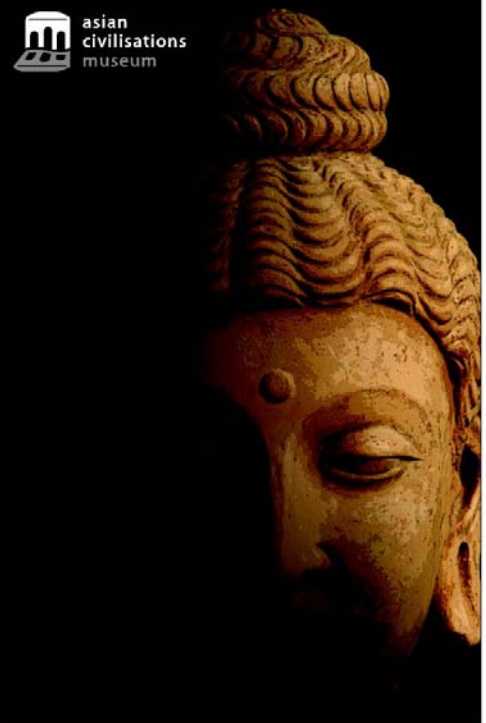
